When your permit is valid

If you have a valid permit, you can park in bays which say 'Resident Permit Holders only' during the following times:

Monday to Friday 10 am to 7 pm.

Cost of Permits

Residents' permits cost £50 a year (£25 a year for motorbikes).

Visitors' permits cost £8 a permit. Each permit is valid for up to five visits.

Refunds

Residents' permits - we will give you one quarter of the fee paid for each full three-month period left on your permit.

Visitors' permits - we will exchange or give you a full refund for each permit which has not been used.

Residents' Parking Guide

THE MORLEY AREA



Who is a resident?

A resident for the purposes of this Parking Scheme is a person whose principal place of abode is at an address in one of the streets listed overleaf.

Residents of new developments, or properties that have been redeveloped or converted since the introduction date of the parking scheme for their area, are generally not eligible for residents' permits. However, these properties may be eligible for visitors' permits. In these circumstances, please contact us for information.

How to obtain a resident's and/or visitors' permit

If you are a resident who is the main insured driver* of a vehicle** you may apply to the Council for the issue of a resident's permit in respect of that vehicle. You may also apply to the Council for the issue of a permit or permits for your visitors' vehicles.

Application forms for both types of permit can be made online by visiting www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/parking, selecting the resident parking option and using the link to apply for permits, or by downloading the forms from our the same page.

Where can a resident or a visitor park and for how long?

Resident's permit holders and their visitors displaying a valid permit will be able to park without limitation in bays specifically signed as Resident Permit Holders only. Permit holders will have use of marked bays or specified lengths of streets during the times and days detailed overleaf. The issuing of a permit does not guarantee that a space will always be available. The existing waiting restrictions in the remaining lengths of streets will continue to apply to residents, their visitors and other motorists. Permit holders may not use Pay & Display spaces without further payment of the parking charges.

Resident or Visitor Permits are not required on a Bank Holiday.

Can a resident apply for more than one visitors' permit?

Each visitor's permit is valid for five visits of up to one day's duration each. A resident may apply for a maximum of 12 permits at any one time. On each visit the visitor must enter his/her vehicle registration number and the date clearly, in ink, on the permit.

Enforcement

Parking Attendants will enforce the parking scheme. A resident must make sure that, during the operational hours, any permit is clearly displayed on the vehicle so that all the details can easily be seen by the attendants. Failure to do so will mean that the resident's or visitor's vehicle is subject to the existing parking restrictions. The co-operation of residents in displaying permits will assist attendants to detect offenders quickly and minimise misuse of residents' parking bays.

Cost of Permits

The current charges are listed overleaf. Each permit is valid only for the parking zone for which it was issued.

Refunds

i) Residents' permits: A permit holder who surrenders a permit to the Council shall be entitled to a refund for each complete three months which remain unexpired, subject to a minimum of three months unexpired. Refunds will be in the form of a cheque, which will be posted to the recipient. Cash refunds cannot be made. ii) Visitors' permits: A resident who surrenders visitors' permits with five days unused shall be entitled to a full refund by cheque for the amount paid for that permit.

Visitors Permits Free of Charge

Any resident who is elderly and or infirm and who requires regular visits from relatives or official services on medical grounds may apply for visitors' permits free of charge by contacting Cambridge Parking Permits on 01223 727900.

The Council requires, on the application form, your doctor to assess your infirmity or lack of mobility together with an estimate of the frequency of official visits required. If you require assistance in filling any forms in, please contact Cambridgeshire Parking Services on 01223 727900. Officers will be happy to help.

How many free permits can a resident obtain?

This will depend on individual circumstances, If you qualify for free visitors' permits, the number to be issued will be determined in the light of your doctor's assessment. No more than 12 permits (ie 60 days or visits) will be issued at one time.

What if I am a registered disabled resident?

You will be entitled to visitors' permits free of charge subject to satisfying the above requirements. However, as a registered disabled person you may be eligible for a blue badge even if you do not own or use a vehicle. Contact Cambridgeshire Direct at 0345 045 5204 for further information.

Any vehicle displaying a valid blue badge can park within a resident's parking space or on a short stay parking space without limit and free of charge.

**The person considered by the insurance company as the person who does the majority of the driving of that vehicle and is usually the policy holder unless otherwise stated. **Vehicle' includes passenger vehicle, dual-purpose vehicle, light goods vehicle under 30cwt/1,500 kg and motorcycle/moped.*
